Over the last two weeks hundreds of kura across New Zealand have had to deal with an Asbestos in Kinetic Sand event. The sand should never have entered our country and more rigorous testing of products by government agencies is needed to protect our whole population.

We had to close a number of sites for a few days while the environments were tested, sand products removed, and a deep clean undertaken by Asbestos Professional Cleaners. We no longer have any sensory sand products in our classrooms. We followed the Work Safe NZ processes to ensure the safety of our students and staff. The professional disposal of the sand products and deep cleans, cost our school a minimum of \$15,000 and climbing. Any vacuum cleaners used had to be disposed of. While we are exploring cost recovery with our insurance firm, one can only imagine the massive cost across the country that could have been avoided.

SUMMER HOLIDAYS CAN BE A WONDERFUL TIME FOR REST, PLAY, AND FAMILY CONNECTION, BUT THEY ALSO BRING BIG CHANGES IN ROUTINE, NEW ENVIRONMENTS, AND LOTS OF SENSORY EXPERIENCES.

KEEP FAMILIAR ROUTINES WHERE POSSIBLE

Use visual timetables, calendars, or simple "first-then" cards to help children anticipate their day.

Keep predictable rhythms around meals, bedtime, and transitions—even when plans change.

### **FOOD AND PICNICS**

Holidays often involve new foods, smells, and eating environments.

Allow familiar favourites alongside new foods.
Keep pressure low: exploring food with eyes, hands, or smell is participation too!

### PREPARING FOR NEW PLACES

Show photos or videos of new parks, pools, or whānau gatherings ahead of time.

Offer choices

Have a plan for breaks

### SENSORY-FRIENDLY OUTDOOR PLAY

Water play: buckets, sprinklers, toy washing, beach visits—
great for regulation and engagement.
Movement breaks: swimming, trampolines, scooters,
playground swings—all supportive "heavy work" options.
Offer sun hats, rash shirts, or preferred textures to keep
children comfortable.
