Kia ora koutou,

Speed limits to drop to 40km/h outside Tauranga schools for drop-off and pick-up: For clarification we already have the 40k speed limit around the streets of our Base School and Tauranga Intermediate, not just for drop-off and pick-up times.

However, for your information we received an email on Monday 10 June from Travel Safe Schools that speed limits will drop to 40km/h outside Tauranga schools for drop-offs and pick-ups. These reduced speed limits outside school gates were made by our outgoing Tauranga City Council Commissioners at their recent council meetingThese reduced limits will be variable, which means they only apply 30 minutes before the start of the school day and 20 minutes after school ends. Outside of these times speed limits will remain the same. Council's Head of Transport Nic Johansson said, "the desire to manage speed limits at high-risk locations is about improving safety on local roads."

"Our local schools have told us that increased traffic and people driving vehicles at high speeds is a significant risk to student safety. While pedestrian fatalities aren't a common occurrence, accidents do happen, and speed is a factor in the likelihood and outcomes. Lower speeds allow for shorter sight and braking distances which is important in complex, busy situations such as school pick-up and drop-off times".

The reduced speed limits, with signs advertising when the speed limits are operational, will be introduced over the next few months as the signs become available.

From our point of view the decision was a no-brainer, as I mentioned at the start of this message, we already have the 40k speed limit in place all the time. We would like to add and appreciate if everyone using the Kaka Street Cul-de-sac to access the back of our school, reduce their speed to well below the 40k. It is a very narrow street, during school time filled up with our staff's vehicles and the many coming and going of taxi vans and parents dropping off and picking up our students. **SLOW and EASY please.**

One additional change to our roading network that just started this week is the construction of a lights controlled crossing on Fraser Street between 18th and 17th Avenues. The project is expected to take eight weeks to complete. Please take care when travelling through this area, delays and disruption will be a factor.



Our students have been wonderful ambassadors for our school, using fantastic manners when out and about and making new friends along the way.


Tauranga Intermediate - Jolani's Class

This term our inquiry has been all about who we are and where we live. As part of our inquiry we have been visiting our favourite local playgrounds around Tauranga Moana. We have also been learning about Māori cultural stories such as Ko Mauao te maunga: Legend of Mauao and Taurikura as well as waiata such as Tauranga Moana, E hika tū ake and Papaki tū ana that are important to Tauranga Moana.



Mana Kaha Team

Each week our ākonga (*learners*), kaiako and kaiāwhina (*teachers and teacher aides*) from our kura work together, experience success and navigate challenges too. Our kura is continuing to support our ongoing learning and mahi together using the Team Teach framework.

Our staff and students are supported to seek and offer help when navigating challenges, so we've created visuals in the form of posters to encourage this.

Here is one of the posters that you'll now see in our learning spaces. Our staff model the 'help' sign for ākonga throughout the day for so many routine activities. This poster is a reminder to seek **help** and to suggest **more help** for each other specifically by changing face/swapping in and out of situations. Often a change of face significantly helps to de-escalate a situation, and ensures that risk is minimised and the hauora (wellbeing) of all is preserved. When we seek help regularly in times of low stress (like in regular routines), then seeking/offering help in times of high stress becomes more routine and more effectively fosters positive change in a situation.
